






Patron Saints of Nothing




Emma Saylor doesn't remember a lot about her mother who died when Emma was twelve. But she does remember the stories her mom told her



Three young people working in a store called Unclaimed Baggage, cataloging and selling other people's



American Street Ibi Zoboi


In this stunning debut novel, Pushcart-nominated author Ibi Zoboi draws on her own experience as a young Haitian


Dear Evan Hansen: The Novel Val Emmich, Steven Levenson, et al.

Seventeen-year-old Maya Aziz is torn between worlds. There's the proper one her parents expect for their good Indian daughter and then there is the world of her dreams.




Holding Up the Universe Jennifer Niven

Everyone thinks they know Libby Strout, the girl once dubbed "America's Fattest Teen." But no one's taken the time to look past her weight to get to know who she really is.




Opposite of Always Justin A. Reynolds
