



# Graphic Novels for Tweens




## Pie in the Sky by Remy Lai


## Sanity and Tallulah by Molly Brooks


## New Kid by Jerry Craft

Although they are awful at soccer, Faith and her teammates soon form a bond both on and off the soccer field that challenges their notions of loyalty, identity, friendship, and unity.




## The Prince and the Dressmaker by Jen Wang


## White Bird by R. J. Palacio


### Best Friends by Shannon Hale


### Camp by Kayla Miller

Olive loves camp, but her friend Willow is struggling. The pressure of being Willow’s security blanket proves to be too much—Will their friendship survive camp?




### Guts by Raina Telgemeier


### Making Friends by Kristen Gudsnuik
