


Amber And Clay by Laura Amy Schlitz

Told from different points of view this recounts the story of what happened at Kent State in May 1970, when four college students were killed by National Guardsmen.




White Rose by Kip Wilson





Picked on at home, criticized for talking trash while beating boys at basketball, and always seen as less than her best friend, a girl struggles to like and accept herself.




Muted by Tami Charles

When Robyn and his brothers are turned into ravens through the work of a curse, their younger sister is their only hope for them to become human again. Even though she's never met them.




Starfish by Lisa Fipps


Closer To Nowhere by Ellen Hopkins
