



Eragon by Christopher Paolini


Hatchet by Gary Paulsen

The Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood










Ender's Game by Orson Scott Card




The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton

It was a dark and stormy night.



Jane Eyre by Charlotte Bronte

Jane finds herself drawn to his troubled yet kind spirit. She falls in love. But there is a terrifying secret inside the gloomy, forbidding Thornfield Hall.



The Lightning Thief by Rick Riordan


Percy, a demigod son of Poseidon, must go across the U.S. in search of Zeus's stolen lightning bolt, adventuring with humans and gods along the way.

Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone by J.K. Rowling
